



General Assumptions for Proposed New Building Replacements and Renovation Projects

Most of the Richmond Public Schools are in need of renovation or should be replaced with a new building. Only four buildings [Blackwell ES, Linwood Holton ES, Miles Jones ES, and Lucille Brown MS] have been built since 1996 and therefore require only ongoing maintenance. Approximately one third of the buildings are at least 70 years old; another third are at least 50 years old. The sheer size of the task alone requires that priorities and an order of implementation should be developed and agreed upon.

The buildings on the following pages are in need of renovation or replacement. Because of the large number of buildings, the exact order of projects becomes secondary since all buildings cannot be modernized or replaced at the same time. For the purposes of this plan, the following definitions are used to describe the extent of proposed renovation:

- Major Renovation includes extensive renovations to bring the building into compliance with current codes and educational specifications. This would include replacement of all major building systems and components such as Heating/Ventilating/Air-conditioning (HVAC), plumbing, electrical, roofing, windows, flooring, ceiling, lighting, technological upgrades, work required for handicapped accessibility (ADA), and interior reconfiguration of space to comply with the educational program.
- **Moderate Renovation** includes bringing most of the building systems and components into compliance with current codes and educational specifications. However the work would not be as extensive as a full modernization. Some interior reconfiguration of spaces may be undertaken.
- *Minor Renovation* includes selective upgrades of some systems or components. Much of this modernization would include replacement of flooring, ceiling, lighting, electrical upgrades and painting. It may also include some minor reconfiguration of interior spaces.

- The final refinement and implementation of the master plan may require that, in certain schools, it be necessary to undertake additional architectural and engineering studies to determine whether the facility can be most effectively renovated or needs to be replaced. If this becomes necessary, the plan can be adjusted accordingly.
- Also, any ADA improvements identified in the January 2005 Americans With Disabilities Accessibility Study need to be incorporated into any level of renovation recommended.

Facility Changes in Area C 2002 - 2007

Whitcomb Elementary was closed in the fall of 2006. Boundaries were adjusted in the spring of 2006, and Whitcomb students were distributed among other elementary schools in Area C. Onslow Minnis closed as a middle school at the end of the 2003/2004 school year. The Franklin Military Academy program began using the Onslow Minnis building in the 2005/2006 school year after the closing of the Armstrong High School facility where the program was housed. Mosby Middle School was renamed Martin Luther King Middle School.

Recommendation Update

The elementary school recommendation includes having 4 elementary schools and includes:


- Building two new elementary schools on sites to be determined [TBD] for Fairfield Court and Woodville,
- and building a new elementary school on the George Mason site.
- Chimborazo would require a minor renovation.
- The need for a school in the Fulton area and closure of the Bellevue building should be reviewed based on population growth in the area and the ability to accommodate all students while the building program is underway.
- Boundaries will need to be adjusted for all the elementary schools.

** Two new schools are anticipated in Area C in the first two phases of the plan. Cost estimates for these schools (George Mason and Woodville) are total project costs. Due to the uncertainty of construction costs, the estimates for projects in future phases are based on a simple inflation of the 2002 Facility Master Plan cost estimates.




