



Treasurer's Report: Karen Flanders presented the Treasurer's Report for April 2008. At April 30, the CHA has \$46,400 cash in the bank. Cash receipts for the month were \$446, expenditures were \$277, for an increase in cash of \$168.

Zoning: The Zoning Committee is considering a name change to reflect the advisory nature (as opposed to regulatory) of the committee.

Newsletter: No report.

Clean and Safe: The Alley Rally will be June 14th.

Membership: No report.

Nominating: The slate of Nominees will be printed in the

May newsletter.

Announcements: President Jim Daab will not be at the May membership meeting so Vice President John Johnson will preside.

Richmond of the World is an event to promote a Richmond Regional Community and link with our sister city in England. A tea will be held in Libby Hill Park on May 4th to demonstrate a proud, unified community.

A Public Square meeting discussing the James River will be held May 5th.

Richmond Parks and Recreation will hold a meeting May 5th to discuss the redesign of Chimborazo Playground Park.

At the 7th District Community Meeting on April 29th, Dolores McQuinn indicated that the Echo Harbour Project is still being discussed. The Board will continue to monitor this issue. The position of the CHA (approved 10/15/06) is that "The Church Hill Association opposes the development as proposed and recommends no rezoning other than RF-1 with its 60 foot height limit."

The Gargantuan Yard Sale will be June 7th from 9AM until dark at Libby Hill Park.

<u>Old Business</u>: The By-Laws are still under incremental revision with no changes since the last meeting.

New Business: The Board held a general discussion about a regional approach to the area. John Johnson will look into establishing a confederation of local neighborhood associations and invite interested parties to the June picnic. The Board will have generic business cards printed for the CHA and will have name tags to use at the membership meetings.

Having no further business the meeting was concluded at 8:15 pm.






